As we watch the unrest that is so vividly playing out in our country right now, and as we experience the sadness and outrage that racial injustice continues to create, I am compelled to offer my voice to our school community.

The death of George Floyd and countless others, points to the systemic injustice that has long plagued our country, and that in this moment is being called out. What we are seeing in our own city and across this country is evidence that this burden, this pain, and this horrific grief has been carried far too long. It must stop. Never before in our history have these conversations been more important. As difficult as it is to see our streets and cities in our nation amidst such unrest, I have hope. I have hope that real change can happen. I have hope that each of us will ask ourselves: what can be done? What is my role in combating injustice and racism? What more can I do? What must happen now for this country to make amends and become a nation for all?

I have hope that together we will seek these answers and together we can learn and build.

As a white leader, I know that it is going to take more than desire. I know I don't always get it right. Yet, I also know that our community will continue to guide me as we move forward in this work. And that together, we will make a difference.

Our community aches. My heart is aching too. Together, we will chart a path forward and create the change that is needed in our world.
